



Get to know us



Direct Care Aid, LaShae Williams

As a direct care aid, I provide support and complete the intake assessment when families first arrive at shelter. I answer phones as well as direct people to other shelter options in Allegheny County. I am available to assist clients with personal care items as well as basic daily needs. When necessary, I sort through donations and provide them to the families that are currently staying with us. Lastly, I will at times clean out the rooms and prepare them for the next family that will be staying in our program.

I am proud that we provide services for families in crisis. Womanspace East is not just for shelter space. People staying with us are given assistance in so many other avenues. We are one of the biggest family shelters and we can assist larger families and households with temporary housing during their current crisis. We also take pride in cleanliness and ensure the safety of our clients, which is our top priority next to finding suitable housing for their specific family unit.

Spaces to grow

The teens staying with us participated in a teen night at the Carnegie Museum as part of their teen outreach program. The Homeless Children's Fund provided bus tickets for them to attend. The teens got to discuss career options and college choices with students who were currently enrolled in Carlow College.



The good you create

Veronica came to us with her 6-year-old daughter after time spent living couch to couch in various friends' homes. She had to overcome many obstacles while in shelter. She had little or no credit history and owed a past landlord a substantial amount of money. Criminal charges from nine years ago were



also preventing her from getting housing. Veronica started working two jobs to save for a deposit pay off some of the balance from her previous apartment. She worked days at Walmart and nights online while family members watched her young daughter. Eventually she was able to secure housing after more than a dozen applications. Her case worker at WSE connected her with programs to provide her furniture and houseware.
